

Obstruction

Preventing the free movement of a person and/or vehicle, or restricting the access to or egress from a designated passageway.

Pets

Being in possession of an animal, other than those trained and required for service to people with disabilities, in a University-owned facility. Students living in on-campus housing may have fish (Please consult Appendix J for further information related to pets on campus).

Possession of Stolen Property

Receiving, retaining, storing, or disposing of movable property which belongs to another person knowing that it has been stolen, or having reason to believe that it has been stolen unless it is clear that the property is received, retained, or stored with the specific intent to restore it to the proper owner.

Property Damage

Causing or assisting with the misuse, vandalism, malicious or unwarranted damage or destruction, defacement, disfigurement, or unauthorized use of property belonging to the University or another person or organization. Examples include, but are not limited to, fire alarms, fire equipment, elevators, telephones, keys, library materials, statues, artwork, or vehicles.

Recreational Equipment

Using bicycles, scooters, in-line skates, skateboards and other recreational equipment on any University-owned property in a manner that causes (or may cause) damage, hazardous conditions, or harm to self or others.

Residence Hall Infractions

Failure to adhere to the guidelines as outlined in Appendix J in the *Eagle Student Handbook*. Please refer to Appendix J for further information.

Sexual Infractions

Morehead State University will not tolerate sexual offenses in any form. Sexual offenses include, but are not limited to, indecent exposure, sexual misconduct, sexual abuse, and rape, including acquaintance rape. (Please refer to Appendix N in the *Eagle Student Handbook* for more detailed information related to policies associated with offenses.) Examples of such prohibited conduct include, but are not limited to:

- a. **Assault**
Abusing, non-consensual fondling, or touching of another person, in areas of the body considered private, including acts against their will by threat, force, and/or intimidation.
- b. **Harassment**
Using physical conduct or verbal innuendo of a sexual nature, when (1) submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of an individual's status in a course, program or activity; (2) submission to or rejection of such conduct by an individual is used as the basis for decisions affecting such individual, including, but not limited to, grades or academic

progress; or (3) such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's academic performance or of creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive environment.

- c. **Misconduct**
Engaging in, or advocating engagement in, inappropriate sexual acts. Examples include, but are not limited to, indecent exposure and engaging in sexual activity in public.
- d. **Rape**
Engaging in sexual intercourse with another person against his/her will by forcible compulsion, threat, intimidation, or when the other person is incapable of giving consent due to age restrictions or impairment.

Solicitation

Distributing, promoting, selling, advertising, or collecting information or material goods on University property or within University-owned facilities without permission from an authorized University official. Requesting that someone engage in the aforementioned activities on behalf of an individual or organization.

Stalking

Intentionally and repeatedly, for no legitimate purpose, engaging in conduct toward another person in any form (e.g., personal visits, telephone calls, instant messages, letters) which causes that person to reasonably fear personal harm. Examples include, but are not limited to: (1). Following a person into public places where the individual has been previously warned to cease such conduct; (2). contacting another person repeatedly where the individual has been previously warned to cease such conduct; and/or (3). engaging in a course of conduct, or repeatedly committing acts which cause a person to reasonably fear physical injury.

Theft

Intentionally or unintentionally taking (or attempting to take) property belonging to the University, members of the Morehead State University community, visitors, guests, or another person or organization.

Tobacco

Using tobacco products in a manner that is contrary to established guidelines related to residence halls or other University-owned and operated facilities. Tobacco products include, but are not limited to, cigarettes, cigars, loose-leaf tobacco, chew, snuff, or other substances of similar nature that can be easily confused for tobacco.

Trespassing

Entering a building or area where the individual has been informed by University officials and/or law enforcement officers that s/he has been restricted from that facility or location. Being in a University-owned or controlled facility after designated hours of operation without written permission from designated officials.

Unauthorized Entry

Entering a building or area without proper authorization from University officials and/or the owner of the property in question.
