

a. Offenses Against Persons

- 1) Threatening or causing physical harm or abuse to one's self or another person. Physical abuse includes, but is not limited to, personal injury, physical restraint against a person's will, and holding or transporting an individual against his or her will.
- 2) Threatening or causing non-physical abuse of or abusive behavior toward another person, including, but not limited to, verbal or written statements that constitute a form of expression unprotected by law, such as obscenity, fighting words, or defamation. Non-physical abuse means psychological abuse or abusive behavior through oral or written statements that are intended or could reasonably be foreseen to cause disruption, embarrassment, humiliation, shame, fright, grief, or intimidation.
- 3) Any actual or threatened non-consensual sexual act.
- 4) Stalking, which is defined here as willfully, maliciously, and repeatedly following, contacting, or harassing another person or series of people in a manner that would cause a reasonable person to feel frightened, intimidated, threatened, harassed, or molested.
- 5) Relationship/Domestic Abuse or Violence, which is defined as the occurrence of one or more of the following between an individual and a household member or dating partner: (a) attempting to cause or causing physical harm or placing another in fear of imminent physical harm or violence; or (b) harassment, meaning a course of conduct that would cause a reasonable person to fear unlawful sexual conduct, unlawful restraint, bodily injury, or death, including but not limited to verbal threats (by whatever medium communicated), vandalism, or physical contact where there is not consent; or (c) any crime, or attempted crime, involving endangerment of, harm to, or threats of endangerment or harm to, a person, including, without limitation: domestic assault; sexual assault; stalking; lying in wait; lewd or lascivious conduct; arson; unlawful restraint; burglary; manslaughter and murder; kidnapping; reckless endangerment; and maiming.

b. Property Offenses

- 1) Destroying or vandalizing property, or intending to destroy or vandalize property, including, but not limited to, University owned or leased property, fire alarms, extinguishers, and other safety devices.
- 2) Trespassing upon, forcibly entering, or otherwise proceeding into unauthorized areas of University owned or leased buildings or facilities, their roofs, or the residential space of another without permission.
- 3) Unauthorized or inappropriate use of University property or the property of others.
- 4) Unauthorized or inappropriate use, duplication, or possession of keys, computer access codes, long distance caller identity codes, or other security mechanisms.
