How to Report

At SUNY Geneseo, we are committed to helping every member of our community reach their full potential by fostering an environment that allows everyone to feel affirmed, regardless of identity or background. As expressed in our Community Commitment to Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (<https://www.geneseo.edu/diversity>) bias-related incidents challenge and contradict this commitment.

Bias Prevention and Response Team FAQs

Restricting the speech of a group or individual jeopardizes everyone's rights. The same laws used to silence **hate** can also be used to silence **love**.

The First Amendment protects the right to say hateful things, but as a campus, SUNY Geneseo strives to be a community where no one chooses to express hate.

What is a Bias-Related Incident?

An incident motivated by the offender's bias against a targeted person or group. (Ex. Race, Gender, Sexual Orientation, Disability, etc.)

What is a Hate Crime?

A criminal offense committed against a person or property, motivated by the offender's bias against a targeted person or group.

What is Freedom of Speech?

The right to articulate an opinion or idea without interference or retaliation from the government. ("Speech" also includes what a person wears, reads, performs, protests, symbols, etc.)

<p>The First Amendment</p> <p style="font-size: x-small;">Provides protections in political advocacy – rhetoric meant to inspire action against unjust laws or policies – which is essential to democracy.</p> <p style="font-size: x-small;">Exceptions NOT Protected: 'True Threat' speech that a person would perceive as an immediate threat to their physical safety. 'Incitement of Illegal Activity' speech that provokes others to break the law. 'Harassment' speech aimed at an individual on the basis of a protected characteristic that is pervasive and severe, is a direct or implied threat, or creates an intimidating, hostile, and demeaning atmosphere.</p>	<p>The Supreme Court</p> <p style="font-size: x-small;">Has held that if a public university voluntarily funds student activities it cannot selectively withhold them from particular student publications simply because they advocate a controversial point of view.</p> <p style="font-size: x-small;">Has held that the government cannot prevent speech on the ground that it is likely to provoke a hostile response – this is called the rule against a "heckler's veto."</p> <p style="font-size: x-small;">Has held that the government cannot punish inflammatory speech unless it intentionally and effectively provokes a crowd to immediately carry out violent and unlawful action.</p>

When Filing a Report

- Provide as much information as possible by filling out as many fields as possible and thoroughly describing the incident where prompted.
- Use the third person and past tense when describing the incident.
- You may share your name or remain anonymous. Remember that our

follow-up and investigation will be more limited if your contact information is not provided.

Bias Prevention and Response Team (BPRT)

The BPRT is comprised of committed students, faculty, and staff members who work to prevent bias-related incidents and support our campus community when these incidents occur.

Specifically, this team will be charged with:

- Monitoring the needs of the campus, based on trends in bias, and counsel groups to create opportunities for educational initiatives on the topics of diversity, equity, and inclusion.
- Mediating restorative justice conversations between parties involved

- Reflecting on and assessing the effectiveness of the BPRT in order to inform the future of the team.

Frequently Asked Questions

What behaviors create a non-inclusive campus climate?

What happens after I report an incident?

Will I find out what happened to the accused party?

What can I do if I'm dissatisfied with the outcome?

What is the process for addressing bias-related incidents?

Geneseo is committed to providing an equitable and welcoming climate for all students. Some bias-related incidents and non-inclusive climate behaviors are criminal and will be investigated by the University Police Department, and/or violate Geneseo's [Student Code of Conduct](#) and thus may be addressed in a student conduct proceeding. In the case of Code violations, disciplinary actions may be imposed and are listed under "Article V-Sanctions" in the Code of Conduct.

When an incident is reported that has been determined to not be illegal or a violation of the Student Code of Conduct, it is still important to recognize the negative impact that it has had on member(s) of our community. When the parties are known, attempts will be made to provide resources and support to those impacted and to provide education to those who caused harm. If all parties are willing, members of the Bias Prevention and Response Team will facilitate a Restorative Justice dialogue with the goal of developing a mutual understanding and repairing any harm that has occurred. Restorative Justice emphasizes repairing the harm caused by negative, inequitable, hurtful behavior. It is best accomplished through cooperative processes that allow all willing involved or impacted individuals to meet, have a dialogue about the harm, and discover a resolution together. The restorative justice process can lead to the transformation of people, relationships, and communities.

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
